There have been two council meetings since the Annual Congregational meeting. Here are some of the highlights from those meetings.

We recognize the transportation challenges in the GTA and are making changes to the location of two upcoming events to make them more accessible for everyone.

The annual planning day will be held on August 25 at the church; details for the event will be sent in early August.

On June 24<sup>th</sup> our first Summerfest event will be held in Fellowship Hall with an informal worship service followed by a delicious potluck lunch and games for all ages.

Members of Council approved financial grants for youth in our congregation who are planning to attend a United Church or other Christian camp this summer. Please contact K. Shikaze for more details on the grants.

In June we will bid farewell to S. Vidovic, the Tenor Section Lead in the choir. We thank him for sharing his gift of music with us over the last year and wish him well as he completes his studies at the Glenn Gould School.

Under L. Fujita's leadership, a database of members and friends of Bayview United is being developed that will centralize changes to the contact information and status. A new telephone tree will be created to improve our ability to contact and share information in our community.

Our search for leaders for the Youth and Sunday School classes continues with ads posted at Emmanuel and Knox Colleges and at Toronto Conference. Until those positions are filled we are asking for volunteers to lead classes for September.

This year the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre will be recognizing the contributions made by churches to the Japanese Canadian community at their Nostalgia Night 2018 held in July. At this year's celebration, K. and R. Shikaze have agreed to attend and receive the award for Bayview United Church.

# **Community and Global Partnership**



DVRR: An Eritrean family of four arrived in late March and are slowly settling in. For years, the Nearly New Shop at Lansing United Church has donated clothing and other items to help our DVRR refugees. After being closed for renovations, they are re-opening soon and will appreciate your donated items. All income will go towards their outreach activities.

Mission and Service Stew Day was held on March 4th. Stew sales (\$383.75), bake table (\$140), Japanese food table (\$286) and cookbooks (\$16.25) raised a total of \$826.50 for our Mission and Service Fund.

On January 24th, Mission Sunday, we served delicious homemade soup and raised \$368. Our Lenten offerings (\$1,812) brought the total to \$2,180. An additional \$1,000 was added from the Audrey Sasaki Fukuzawa Fund making a total of \$3,180 which was forwarded to Doctors without Borders.

On Sundays, our team members have been reading the Calls to Action set forth by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. We hope that by reading this, it will make us aware of this very important issue.



# Women's Fellowship Circle

The annual Daybreak was held on Saturday, February 10<sup>th</sup>, 2018, at the Momiji Seniors Centre. Forty-two ladies enjoyed our guest speaker, Rev. J. Toward, a spiritual intuitive, clairvoyant and spiritual healer. Rev. Toward shared some of her stories with us and offered individual readings. The following is an excerpt from J. Cermak's experience:

"Our speaker for Daybreak this year was Rev. J. Toward, a clairvoyant and spiritual healer. When I was coming here today, the woman who gave me a ride asked me what the presentation would be about. I said, "Rev. Toward is an intuitive – she can sense things about people even if she hasn't met them before. She's going to tell each of us what she senses about us, and offer insights into our lives." My friend didn't answer, and after a pause, I continued, "So sit in the back row and don't make eye contact." We both laughed. My companion said, "And I'll scrunch right down." I was planning to scrunch right down too – I was a bit nervous about what Rev. Toward would say to me, and the fact that the whole group would hear what she had to sav.

Rev. Toward began by sharing some of her story with us. She told us that from a young age she had had an ability to sense what was going on in other people's lives, and that her ability ran in her family, back several generations, and also forward, to her two daughters. She offered to speak to each person in our group of more than forty women, and also assured us that anyone who didn't want a reading could pass.

Then she began speaking to each person individually. After she had spoken to a few individuals, it was clear that most people could hardly wait for their turn.

I still remember what Rev. Toward said to me, but with a room full of people, I didn't remember what she had said to others. I found that was a common reaction – each woman remembered what Jean said about her, but was pretty vague about what was said to others. So although she spoke in front of everyone, each individual had a rather private encounter with her. We really appreciated Rev. Toward's sharing her gift with us, and her husband's bringing her here from Stoney Creek, on such a snowy winter day."

Our thanks to R. Shikaze and her committee for spearheading this event and to all the ladies who prepared the delicious lunch of cold cuts, salads and desserts.

The following verse from Hymn 518 is what we have been singing for the last few Sundays as we dedicate our offering.

A world in need now summons us to labour, love, and give, to make our life an offering to God, that all may live.
The church of Christ is calling us to make the dream come true:

a world redeemed, by Christ-like love, all life in Christ made new.

The verse reminds me of the famous quote from Mahatma Gandhi .......

"Live Simply So Others May Simply Live."

This is difficult to achieve in this twenty-first century environment, but we can still think about the concept and attempt to achieve it at least to some small degree.

I don't like to nag but I would like to remind you of PAR as an alternative way of supporting your church. PAR is a direct debit program that allows people to support their church through an automatic monthly withdrawal from their bank account. The United Church administers the program following the giver's wishes (e.g., a specified amount for local church expenses and another specified amount for the Mission and Service Fund). Once a month, all PAR donations will be debited from your bank account and then the total, less a service fee of \$0.50, will be electronically transferred to BUC's bank account. PAR reduces the volunteer time that is required

to record your donation to BUC. Let me know if you would like to support your church using PAR.

### **Property and Administration**

The Property and Administration team has several big projects planned for the summer months. Our first major project is to work on a standardized address database which will be used for all mailings and correspondence with the congregation. Property projects include removal of the dead tree on the north side of the building and repair and/or replacement of the sidewalk, handicap ramp and two entrance porches on the north side.

We will be installing a security camera at the main entrance to ensure the safety of members, tenants and staff who may be working alone in the building.

We are also looking for volunteers to be trained in first aid, CPR and use of the defibrillator. These should be people who attend church frequently and are willing to act as BUC first responders in the event of an emergency. If you are willing to take on this important role, please contact L. Fujita.

Our custodian, K. Campbell, has advised that he plans to take the summer off so we have hired K. Bryan to function as the custodian over the summer. Please introduce yourself to him on Sunday.

There are a few other smaller projects which we are currently tendering for quotes so you will see some changes and updates in various areas of the church over the next few months.




